- transport passengers by rail, water, air or road;
- transport goods by rail, water, air, road or pipeline; and
- warehouse or store goods.

2. Industry's Growth

- The Transportation and Warehousing industry accounted for 6.1% of total employment in Alberta in 2017.
- Employment in this industry is expected to grow at an average rate of 1.5% from 2017 to 2021⁴.
- The industry is expected to account for 5.9% of total employment in Alberta in 2018.

3. Facts, Trends and Outlook

According to Statistics Canada’s National Economic Accounts, the Transportation and Warehousing industry accounted for approximately 4.2% ⁶ of Alberta’s Gross Domestic Product in 2016, up from 4.1% in 2006. Its contribution to Alberta’s total employment increased from 5.4% in 2007 to 6.1% in 2017.

Total employment (the total number of employees and self-employed people, 15 years and over) in 2017 was 6.3 % lower than its level in 2016. Over the last 10 years, employment increased by 32,500 from 2007, a 23.2% increase. There were 140,100 employed in the industry in 2017, of whom 89.1% were full time and 10.9% were part time.

As a result, the total number of employees by establishment size will not be the same as total employment in the industry, except by coincidence.

2. Demographics: Gender and Age

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Transportation and Warehousing industry in 2017 was as follows:

- women employed: 31,000 people, or 22.1%
- men employed: 109,100 people, or 77.9%

Overall in Alberta, women accounted for 45.5% and men made up 54.6% of total employment (for all industries).

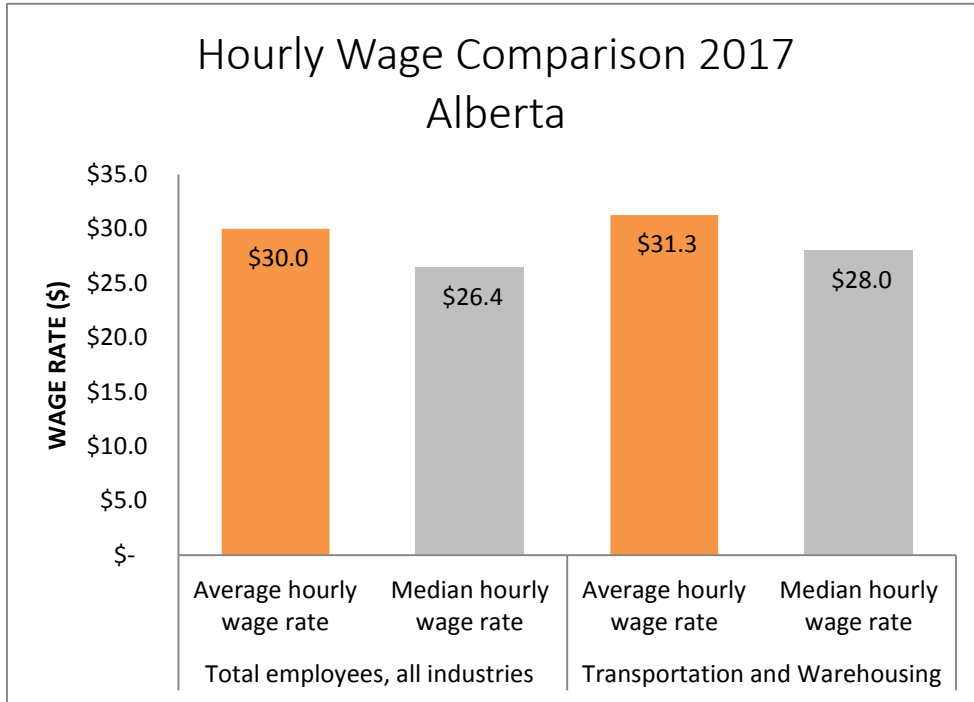
